recognized for accomplishing in their lifetime especially during the course of their career. Today it is less a specific product that entices the customer and more the reputation of the firm—and the firm’s brand is sustained and enhanced by the firm’s leadership brand. A leadership brand represents the identity and reputation of leaders in the company. Leaders demonstrate a brand when they think and act in ways congruent with the desired product or firm brand. A leadership brand exists when leaders at all levels demonstrate a consistent reputation for both attributes and results” (Ulrich and Smallwood, 2012, <https://www.rbl.net/insights/articles/leadership-as-a-brand>). achieve a uniform goal (Rudolph Muteswa, 2021:96). The next section will cover information about philanthropy in-depth.

### 1.3 What is an entrepreneur, philanthropist and exemplary leadership

**What is an entrepreneur?** “For the context of this textbook the meaning of the term ‘*entrepreneur*’ is a person who takes a bold step to establish his/her own business with the main aim of making a profit and in most instances they proceed to gather all the needed resources (*namely; money, labour, technology and the formation of an effective business model*) without fearing their immediate negative environmental factors that may hinder their chances of success.<sup>5</sup> Another definition of the term ‘*entrepreneur*’ clearly states that ‘an entrepreneur’ is someone who takes calculated risks by first carrying-out two activities: (1) they conduct a market research to first test-out their business idea and (2) they draw up business plans, before they start their business in order to identify possible problems or competition the business will face in the future. While on the otherhand the term ‘*entrepreneurship*’ refers to a career field whereby individuals or entities form their own new businesses to make a profit, create jobs and contribute to economic growth without fearing their immediate negative environmental factors that may hinder their chances of success” (Rudolph Muteswa, 2018:20).<sup>6</sup> According to the University of Basel Center for Philanthropy Studies (2024) **What is Philanthropy?** Human beings, who perform good deeds for others, are characterized as philanthropists. Our understanding of philanthropy can be described in one simple sentence: <sup>7</sup>**Philanthropy includes every voluntary private action for a charitable purpose.** We are faced with the question why we do not choose

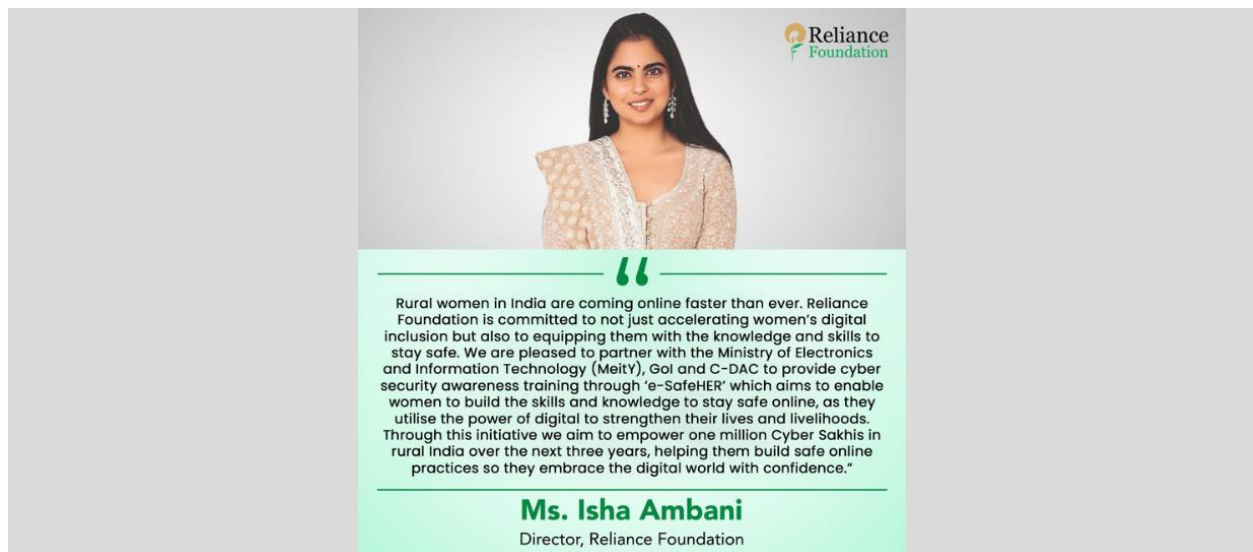

another – more familiar – term to describe our range of activity. One could choose the terms public utility, welfare or civil society. From an organizational perspective, terms like nonprofit organization (or not-for-profit organization), or non-governmental-organization (NGO) could be used. We have chosen the term philanthropy because it contains many aspects that are important to us. **Philanthropy is individual-related.** Philanthropy places the focus on the acting person, whereas other terms have a societal reference. Many philanthropic activities are not generated within an organized framework. This includes neighborly help, spontaneous donations or social movements. In a world, affected by individualism, philanthropy is the answer to why people support common welfare. Every person has his or her own “philanthropic autobiography”, which means that everyone has come into contact with philanthropy at some point. **Philanthropy is value-related.** Philanthropy expresses a value system which can be characterized (in the broadest sense) as human kindness. Philanthropic actions express ethical behavior towards other people. This distinguishes philanthropy clearly from governmental and market-based actions. A clarification based on values seems more important to us than a distinction based on economic purpose. **Philanthropy is universal.** Philanthropy exists worldwide and has its roots in the beginning of civilization. Every world religion has philanthropic rules and recommendations. Nevertheless, philanthropy is free from political, religious or other dogmatic affiliations (University of Basel Center for Philanthropy Studies, 2024, <https://ceps.unibas.ch/en/what-is-philanthropy/> cited in Rudolph Muteswa, 2025:16). The term ‘*exemplary leadership*’ refers to leaders who perform their duties in a way that is considered to be admirable, respectable, humble, ethical, accountable and recognizable to the people they lead to the extent that they are willing to follow in their footsteps in order to achieve what they have accomplished at the workplace or in their lifetime (Rudolph Muteswa, 2019:123). In the Republic of India one of the renowned organization in the field of philanthropy is Reliance Foundation under the exemplary leadership of the exceptional Smt. Nita M. Ambani who is the founder and chairperson. In addition the iconic exceptional and exemplary Smt. Nita M. Ambani is a renowned global entrepreneur as well. **Figure 1.1 Reliance Foundation’s Iconic Exemplary and Outstanding Director Ms. Isha Ambani**



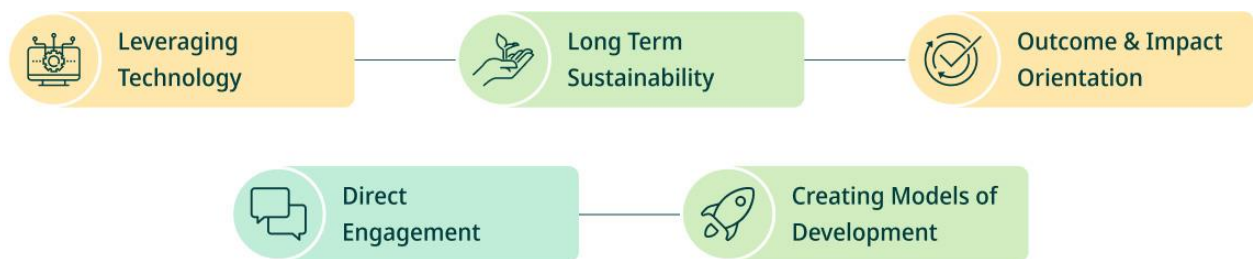

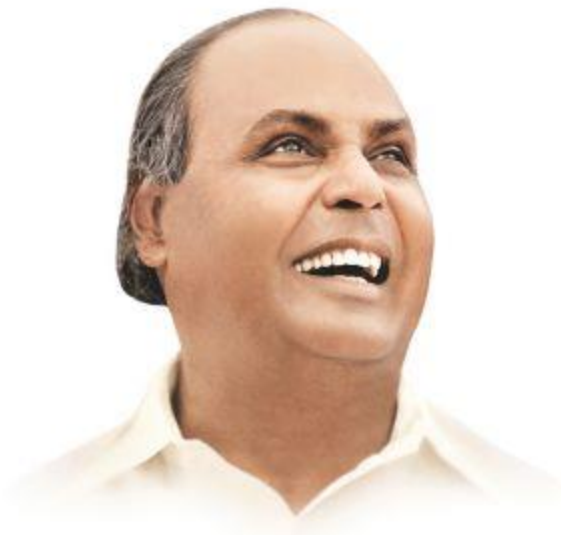

According to Reliance Foundation (2026) **Empowering rural communities with sustainable solutions**. Reliance Foundation's Rural Transformation programme aims to uplift rural communities by enhancing livelihoods, fostering sustainable agriculture, empowering women, and building resilient community structures for water, nutrition, and livelihood security.<sup>20</sup> The Rural Transformation programme focuses on strengthening rural communities through both physical and digital approaches. It works across the block as a key unit of transformation, ensuring localised, scalable solutions. Reliance Foundation works closely with communities to co-develop action plans to ensure a targeted and impactful approach, fostering resilience and self-reliance at every level. Reliance Foundation's Rural Transformation initiatives are structured around two core pillars: Self-Reliance and Resilience, ensuring a thriving rural India aligned with the vision of Viksit Bharat (Developed India) by 2047. The Rural Transformation programme began during the inception of Reliance Foundation in 2010. Built with a strong

participatory approach, today, it has grown to reach millions of communities across the deepest and remotest geographies of India, building strong partnerships with non-profit, community and technical organisation shaping models to guide rural and national development. **Key focus areas.** The programme is implemented through two key focus areas — Reliance Foundation Bharat India Jodo (RF BIJ) and Rural Transformation Information Services (RTIS) — are central to this effort. RF BIJ, initiated in 2010, empowers communities to take collective action towards sustainable livelihoods through multiple pillars. It focuses on building self-reliance by enabling communities to access resources and technologies that support their long-term sustainability. RTIS, by leveraging digital platforms, reaches rural communities across India with critical information and support on farming, fishing, livestock rearing, and more. This phygital approach integrates digital tools to support real-time decision-making while maintaining essential physical outreach for community engagement and support. Reliance Foundation engages with communities through peer and partner organisations and collaborates with the government to leverage synergies. The partnership-driven approach with various stakeholders, including government bodies, non-profits, and entrepreneurs, is pivotal in driving sustainable, community-led development. Sustainable and meaningful change is strongest when it comes from within the community. Reliance Foundation is developing a grassroots leadership cadre, so rural communities move beyond receiving support to actively shaping their own progress. **Broadly, the Rural Transformation programme works towards its vision by:**

- Collaborating with rural communities to ensure that interventions are tailored to local needs.
- Promoting sustainable natural resource management, ensuring long-term environmental sustainability.
- Empowering communities with vital information to strengthen and safeguard livelihoods, leveraging both physical and digital tools<sup>21</sup>.

**“Empowering Women in Rural Communities.** Integral to India’s rural workforce, women have a key role to play in various on farm and off-farm activities. Reliance Foundation’s Rural Transformation programme is centred around the role of women in enhancing resilience and raising household incomes through diversification through its DRIWE and information services initiatives. By leveraging the collective power of self-help groups, Reliance Foundation supports women in agriculture and encourages alternative livelihoods through skill and capacity development.<sup>23</sup> Women are supported in establishing businesses, building brands and developing leadership capacity. The aim is to pave their participation in society and local governance and give them a greater say in the development of their communities. Reliance Foundation has worked with self-help groups in value chains of crops, dairy, arts and handicrafts. In 2023, the Reliance Foundation and Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation launched an initiative to empower one million women entrepreneurs in several states in India, by strengthening women collectives, testing and scaling innovations and establishing replicable models of entrepreneurship with women-led enterprises. This initiative has been developed with and will be delivered through

**“Enhancing Farming Incomes.** Reliance Foundation enables rural households to enhance their incomes through farming, fishing, livestock, poultry and other means of livelihoods with approaches including:

- Equipping communities with knowledge of improved practises and support schemes
- Strengthening collectives<sup>24</sup>

- Disseminating new skills, ways to reduce input costs, support in acquiring improved material/inputs/tools
- Strengthening market linkages
- Information leverage for higher income

These are part of the Integrated Value Chain Development (IVCD) initiative. Lowering costs, increasing yields. To help increase farm incomes, Reliance Foundation works with farmers on the input side to lower costs and increase yields. Cost reduction efforts involve adopting efficient resource management practises and sustainable farming techniques that reduce dependence on supplemental inputs. Farmers are also supported in choosing crops that are best suited to their agro-ecology. Through partnerships with agriculture research institutes, improved seed varieties are provided to farmers. By obtaining necessary information from the Reliance Foundation during the entire duration of the crop cycle, farmers are able to confidently take timely decisions related to field operations. On the output side, farmers are supported in post-harvest primary or secondary processing, where there is scope, through farmer collectives. These collectives, either mentored or supported by Reliance Foundation, procure produce from the farm-gate, help farmers utilize technologies and overcome labour shortage, provide grading or sorting services, process the produce and ensure fair compensation to their member farmers. Through these collectives, farmers also get an opportunity to explore new markets for their produce.<sup>25</sup> They are made aware of government social security schemes and supported in availing of them. Adequate water and healthy soils are key ingredients to good yields. Farmers are supported in getting their soils tested and encouraged to enhance soil health through cost-effective and environmentally sustainable initiatives. Water availability for agriculture is improved by community and individual efforts to harvest rainwater and improve groundwater recharge. Tailored water harvesting plans for each village help increase water harvesting capacity and ensure availability of soil moisture during rabi and summer seasons. So far, more than 1,413 lakh cubic metres of water harvesting capacity has been created across India. This has helped farmers in cropping

more than once during the year and increase their earnings. **Raising poultry, livestock and fishing incomes.** Reliance Foundation supports households in rearing high-yielding breeds of livestock and poultry. Best practises in livestock rearing and feed management are shared and capacity to adopt these practises is built. After initial handholding, households are supported in scaling up their activities. Information about weather and disease alerts, and expert prescriptions for vaccination and treatment provided at free livestock camps help households mitigate livestock related losses. For marine fisherpersons, information about potential fishing zones helps increase the chances of a good catch in the ocean. PFZ information also leads fisherpersons safely and quickly to areas where fish is available. By reducing the fuel expended, this information contributes to lowering the environmental footprint of fisherfolk. **Promoting non-farm livelihoods.** Given the inherent risks in farming and allied activities, Reliance Foundation encourages households to take up non-farm activities alongside farming. Landless and tenant farming households as well as farm labourers are also supported in diversifying their incomes. These activities are entrepreneurial in nature. Tailoring, groceries, confectionary, printing and data entry, other vending and service enterprises are some of avenues for alternate livelihoods. By leveraging government grant and loan schemes through self-help groups, rural households can start, sustain and scale up alternate livelihood activities”<sup>26</sup> (Reliance Foundation, 2026, <https://www.reliancefoundation.org/what-we-do/rural-transformation/enhancing-farming-incomes>). According to Reliance Foundation (2026) **Improved nutrition for rural communities**. Although India’s food production is powered by India’s villages, inadequate dietary diversity in rural households is a significant concern. Reliance Foundation takes a community-centric approach to improve dietary diversity. Raising awareness of the importance of a balanced diet is an indispensable part of this approach. The approach begins with helping communities to increase their farm yields.<sup>27</sup> Households are encouraged to diversify food production to include cereals like millets, fruits, vegetables, milk, legumes and animal sources of protein. Vegetable and fruit production are encouraged through backyard kitchen gardens. Several thousand such gardens have been established by rural communities across India at homes, schools and Anganwadis. Water is linked closely to nutrition, which is why Reliance Foundation’s efforts to conserve water are also aimed at ensuring drinkable water is provided as well as water for agriculture. Besides enhancing source inflows through recharge wells and rainwater harvesting,

Reliance Foundation focuses on improving access to clean drinking water by supporting the development of storage and distribution infrastructure. This includes co-development of piped water supply systems and community-owned and constructed water storage tanks, through various participatory efforts (Reliance Foundation, 2026, <https://www.reliancefoundation.org/what-we-do/rural-transformation/better-nutrition-rural-communities>). **“Securing Livelihoods by Improving Climate Resilience.** A changing climate will significantly affect agricultural and related livelihoods. The Government of India projects that rice yields under rain-fed and irrigated conditions could fall by as much as 20% and 3.5%, respectively, by 2050 in the absence of interventions. <sup>28</sup>For wheat, a 19.3% reduction is projected. Reliance Foundation takes a multipronged approach with rural communities to help smallholder farm households enhance their resilience to pests, diseases and inter-seasonal

climate uncertainties while improving their capacity to adapt to long-term climate related changes through its Climate Resilience for Sustainable Development (CR4SD) initiative. **Adopting resilient crop varieties.** Farm households with small landholdings cultivating conventional varieties of a single crop are more vulnerable to climate shocks than households that cultivate resilient varieties. Reliance Foundation encourages farmers to cultivate resilient varieties with traits like a short maturity cycle, heat, drought or salinity tolerance, and pest and disease resilience. **Diversifying crop production.** Intensive monocropping renders farmers more vulnerable to climate shocks including inter-seasonal dry spells, pests and diseases. <sup>29</sup>To help farmers shift from monocropping, farmers are introduced to crop rotation with pulses, oilseeds and millets along with the incorporation of horticulture and floriculture for enhanced incomes” (Reliance Foundation, 2026, <https://www.reliancefoundation.org/what-we-do/rural-transformation/securing-livelihoods-by-improving-climate-resilience>). According to Reliance Foundation (2026) **Better natural resources management**. Reliance Foundation works with rural communities to enhance crop yields by supporting communities in the sustainable use of land and water.<sup>30</sup> Landscape approaches like contour bunding, land levelling and terracing are advocated alongside practices like raised bed cultivation that can sustain or improve crop yields while reducing erosion. Partnering with entire villages, Reliance Foundation encourages strengthening the water harvesting capacity within communities by supporting the creation of new water harvesting structures and revitalising existing structures. Farmers are supported in adopting efficient irrigation practises like sprinkler and drip irrigation to encourage sustainable water use. **Rural diversification**. A household's resilience is higher when sources of income are diverse. To enhance resilience to long-term climate related challenges, households are supported in diversifying into agri-allied income generating activities like livestock rearing, poultry, fishing and non-farm, skill-based microentrepreneurial activities. Households are supported in acquiring resilient and market-preferred breeds of livestock and

poultry. Through regular capacity enhancement programmes, scientifically-proven practises are shared to help communities in caring for their livestock.<sup>31</sup> Livestock medical camps are regularly organised to help households get timely veterinary treatment. The camps assume greater importance during and after extreme weather events (Reliance Foundation, 2026, <https://www.reliancefoundation.org/what-we-do/rural-transformation/securing-livelihoods-by-improving-climate-resilience>). Now is an opportune moment for the country’s rural communities to close gaps that have persisted through the past. Artificial Intelligence, the Internet of Things, Blockchain, and several other emerging technologies have the potential to help accelerate the transformation of rural communities. <sup>33</sup>**Technology in agriculture.** Agriculture, more than any other sector, has immense potential to accommodate these technologies and overcome yield barriers at a time when climate-related challenges threaten progress. In places across India, Reliance Foundation is demonstrating the effective use of drones in farm operations. Finding new ways to assess crop health for insurance and other purposes is another strong area of focus. While new technologies are beneficial and even crucial to addressing problems like labour shortage, their adoption is not without challenges given the small land-holding sizes of farms. The ‘Health for All’ motto and integrated healthcare model provide a continuum of care to the most vulnerable sections of society from facilitating a robust network of healthcare delivery mechanisms for intensive and crucial preventive and primary healthcare care to world-class quality tertiary care. From deep-reaching community health initiatives and need-based, experienced health outreach services to vulnerable communities, Reliance Foundation complements these with cutting-edge and world-class quaternary care at the Sir H N Reliance Foundation Hospital and Research Centre. <sup>35</sup>**Supporting vulnerable groups.** Supporting most at-need communities to access quality healthcare, the Health Outreach programme of Reliance Foundation promotes preventive healthcare alongside delivering general and specialised therapeutic care for all groups of people in collaboration with other institutions. These initiatives strengthen community well-being and health besides focused interventions on key health problems. Besides providing general primary and preventive care, the programme

According to Reliance Foundation (2026) **Health Initiatives. COVID-19 Response. Strengthening India’s fight against COVID-19 with a 360-degree approach.** The COVID-19 pandemic, the largest humanitarian crisis in recent times, affected every aspect of life in the early 2020s. <sup>37</sup>In India, even as the government provided relief measures and emergency services, people faced new challenges and there was urgent need for coordinated efforts from private partners to enhance and support these initiatives. Reliance drew on its emergency response and disaster management experience, deploying the combined strengths of 600,000+ members of the Reliance family for on-ground efforts, material resources and support for community efforts across the country. Reliance contributed Rs 571 crore to the PM CARES and other funds to help tackle the pandemic. Specific efforts were taken to provide 360-degree support to rural communities for lives and livelihoods. This note encapsulates the different components of the support Reliance provided in responding to COVID-19. **Specialised healthcare infrastructure.** To address the critical need for specialised healthcare facilities, Reliance Foundation, along with entities across the Reliance ecosystem, had set up medical, quarantine, and intensive care units,

providing over 2,000 COVID-19 hospital beds across India. Reliance Foundation's swift response and collaboration with the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation led to the establishment of India's first COVID-19 dedicated hospital in just two weeks. The Sir H.N. Reliance Foundation Hospital and Research Centre played a pivotal role in providing specialised medical facilities and quarantine services, ensuring safety and care of patients within the comfort of their homes. As the second wave struck, Reliance Foundation further expanded its support, establishing a dedicated COVID-19 care facility at the National Sports Club of India, Mumbai, and Gujarat's first pediatric COVID-19 hospital in Jamnagar, all in record time to meet the urgent needs of the prevailing situation. **Mission Oxygen.** Providing crucial support to the nation to meet a sudden shortage of medical oxygen for COVID-19 patients, especially during the second wave, Reliance repurposed its factory in Jamnagar in record time to produce liquid medical oxygen. This was ramped up to meet the life-saving needs of 1,00,000 patients on a daily basis, delivered free of cost to various states. The facility contributed to 11% of India's total production of medical-grade liquid oxygen. <sup>38</sup>Though Reliance was not a manufacturer of medical-grade liquid oxygen, it became India's largest producer of this life-saving resource from a single location in order to stand with the country in its hour of need. Under the personal supervision of Shri. Mukesh D. Ambani, Chairman and Managing Director, the manufacturing facility at Jamnagar in Gujarat was repurposed to produce over 1,000 MT medical grade liquid oxygen and increase transportation capacities. This two-pronged approach helped ensure swift and safe supply to various states and Union Territories across India (Reliance Foundation, 2026, <https://www.reliancefoundation.org/what-we-do/health/covid-19-response>). **“Ensuring primary healthcare.** Reliance Foundation's Mobile Medical Units continued to be a lifeline for rural communities during the pandemic, providing crucial medical assistance and raising awareness about preventive measures such as social distancing, mask-wearing, and hand hygiene in surrounding villages. <sup>39</sup>They played a crucial role in providing continued primary healthcare to the most vulnerable communities, especially those such as pregnant and lactating mothers. Since many people returned to their hometowns and villages due to the pandemic, this was especially important in providing bridge health care. To ensure uninterrupted emergency services, Reliance Foundation provided free fuel to government-authorized vehicles and ambulances, supporting the transportation of COVID-19 patients across 21 states and three

Union Territories. This initiative carried out during the second wave of COVID-19, bolstered emergency response services and facilitated timely medical attention to those in need. **Mission COVID Suraksha.** Mission COVID Suraksha was vital in raising awareness on prevention and safety, distributing 1.4 crore masks to frontline warriors and communities across 26 states and union territories. Reliance Foundation's dedication to protecting vulnerable populations was evident as masks were distributed to police personnel, municipal workers, and high-risk communities. A multi-lingual booklet accompanying the masks provided valuable guidance on proper mask-wearing and hygiene. In addition to masks, Reliance Foundation distributed over 9.5 lakh sanitizers, 5+ lakh ORS packets, and 2+ lakh gloves across 20 states and Union Territories, further supporting communities and frontline workers in the fight against COVID-19. **Mission Vaccine Suraksha.** In April 2021, Reliance Foundation launched Mission Vaccine Suraksha. With a vision of providing free COVID-19 vaccination across the country, this mission covered communities, employees, and families, ensuring equitable access to vaccination for all. <sup>40</sup>Reliance Foundation collaborated with local authorities, governments, and various organisations under the 'We Care' umbrella, providing free vaccination doses to states like Kerala, Gujarat, Rajasthan, Maharashtra, and others, expediting the vaccination drive. The initiative aimed to reach every last-mile resident, including vulnerable group” (Reliance Foundation, 2026, <https://www.reliancefoundation.org/what-we-do/health/covid-19-response>). In 2015, Reliance Foundation along with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, MSD India, Tata Trusts, and the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) launched Project Alliance for Saving Mothers and Newborns (ASMAN), a first-of-its-kind initiative in India. <sup>41</sup>The primary objective of ASMAN was to expedite the reduction of neonatal and maternal mortality rates by enhancing the quality of care provided to mothers and newborns from admission to discharge, a critical period characterised by heightened mortality risk. Employing an innovative approach, Project ASMAN harnesses multiple technology-based healthcare solutions in the states of Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh to bolster the capacity of healthcare providers to deliver safe health outcomes for mothers and newborns (Reliance Foundation, 2026, <https://www.reliancefoundation.org/what-we-do/health/asman-project-alliance-for-saving->

“By leveraging cutting-edge technologies, ASMAN aims to significantly curtail preventable maternal and neonatal deaths in selected health facilities across eight districts in Rajasthan and Madhya Pradesh. **Remarkable strides.** <sup>42</sup>From 2015 to 2022, the ASMAN programme made remarkable strides, impacting the lives of over 7.5 lakh mothers and newborns through 81 government health facilities. From April 2018 to June 2021, the ASMAN app played a pivotal role in registering 4,33,100 cases and detecting 1,65,000 (38%) high-risk cases. ASMANs was recognised with various awards through the duration of the programme until 2021. To gain deeper insights into the ASMAN project and explore its achievements further, access the

According to Reliance Foundation (2026) **Reliance Foundation Drishti**. Bringing light to people's lives has been the vision of Reliance Foundation Drishti a pioneering initiative for over two decades now. With awareness as the first step, Drishti has been at the forefront of this vision care movement for over two decades. Committed to providing comprehensive eye care services to those in need, it also promotes awareness, protects sight and promotes inclusivity for the visually impaired. It also organises eye screening camps across India and provides spectacles for refractive errors. **Partner treatment network**.<sup>44</sup> Through its network of eye hospitals and clinics, the Reliance Foundation Drishti initiative offers a wide range of treatments, including cataract surgery, glaucoma management, and corneal transplants. The transplants are done in association with the National Association for the Blind, Sankara Eye Foundation and Aravind Eye Care. **Braille newspaper**. The initiative also brings out India's only fortnightly international Braille newspaper in Hindi. This was launched in 2012, and its Marathi edition was launched in 2023. Produced in collaboration with the National Association for the Blind, with Shri Swagat Thorat, noted editor and writer as the paper's Chief Editor, the Drishti newspapers cover news and updates besides reader contributions. At the start of every year, a Braille table calendar is

distributed to readers of the paper. **Art & Essay Competition.** The Reliance Foundation Drishti Art & Essay competition, is conducted annually by Reliance among children and grandchildren of its employees, to create awareness about eye donation among the younger generation and encourage them to become ambassadors of eye health during the National Eye Donation Fortnight, from August 25 to September 8. **Encouraging entrepreneurial efforts.** Reliance Foundation Drishti also works in close collaboration with organisations like Sunrise Candles to support entrepreneurial efforts of those with visual impairment by procuring products like diyas and other gifting objects from such enterprises to promote inclusivity. The event this year, takes forward the commitment of work through the years. **External study on Reliance Foundation Drishti.** An external Impact Assessment Study of Reliance Foundation’s Drishti Programme for Improving Vision Care among underprivileged communities of the Reliance Foundation Drishti programme found that corneal transplants have proven instrumental in enhancing the quality of life for those who have been supported. Individuals reporting ‘severe or extreme pain’ decreased from 48% before the surgery to 13.2% after the surgery while social participation increased from 17% to 44%. <sup>45</sup>The programme has saved INR 4.3 crore in potential out-of-pocket expenses of beneficiaries of corneal transplants and has averted 3347 DALYs (Disability-adjusted life year is sum of life years lost due to disability) (Reliance Foundation, 2026, <https://www.reliancefoundation.org/what-we-do/health/reliance-foundation-drishti>). - Over 2 lakh consultations have been conducted, with 18,300+ people being provided with spectacles free of cost after detection of refractive error<sup>46</sup>.
- 4,200 per fortnightly copies are distributed across India and seven other countries with a readership of around 24,000

The Braille newspaper in Hindi in association with the NAB, since 2012, covers news and information for visually impaired readers. During the Reliance Foundation Art and Essay competition 2024, in August 25, 2024 over 7,000 Reliance families from across 85 Reliance locations were involved, giving their children and grandchildren an opportunity to self-express through art and essay writing. In 2024, Drishti also conducted a Braille Essay Competition and out of a total of about 80 entries in Hindi and in Marathi – six winners were selected for Hindi essay and three for Marathi essay writing. These participants are readers of the Reliance Foundation Drishti Braille newspaper. By promoting eye donation and providing quality eye care, Reliance Foundation Drishti is making a significant contribution to the fight against blindness. The Art & Essay Competition for all the children & grandchildren of Reliance employees helps create awareness about eye donation. It encourages the younger generation to become ambassadors of eye health during the National Eye Donation Fortnight. **Journey of our Hospital in 11 Years.** Since its inception, the hospital has healed over 33 lakh lives and has provided more than 12.09 lakh OPD consultations to over 6.77 lakh patients, including 1.75 lakh children. Sir H. N. Reliance Foundation Hospital is the only hospital in Mumbai, and one of the few in India, to perform all five key organ transplants - Heart, Liver, Lung, Kidney, Bone marrow. To date, the hospital has successfully carried out over 690 transplants. The hospital has performed over 2,300 robot-assisted surgeries, offering patients greater precision, safer outcomes, and faster recovery. <sup>48</sup>The hospital has performed over 3,018 paediatric cardiac surgeries till date, reflecting its strong expertise in advanced paediatric cardiac care. In 2023, the hospital set a national milestone by successfully performing six organ transplants in five recipients from three donors within 24 hours—including one heart and double lung transplant, one double lung transplant, two liver transplants, and one kidney transplant. Reliance Foundation Hospital has also achieved several landmark medical milestones in the

recent past, including India's first successful combined heart–liver transplant bridged from a Biventricular Assist Device, the first Harmony Valve implant in paediatric cardiology in Mumbai and Maharashtra, and the first paediatric liver transplant. **Robotic Surgery Programme.** Expanding access to advanced surgical expertise beyond metropolitan centres, Sir H. N. Reliance Foundation Hospital, in collaboration with the Dhirubhai Ambani Occupational Health & Community Medical Centre (DAOH), Jamnagar, has launched India's first Tele-Robotic Surgery Programme, powered by Reliance Jio's secure high-speed digital connectivity.s This pioneering initiative enables expert surgeons in Mumbai to remotely guide and perform robotic-assisted procedures at partner centres, bringing specialised surgical care to patients in non-metro and remote regions. The first successful tele-robotic surgery performed at Jamnagar marks a significant milestone in India's telemedicine and robotic surgery ecosystem. **Advanced Medical Technologies.** Sir H. N. Reliance Foundation Hospital continues to strengthen its position as a technology-driven healthcare institution through the introduction of several landmark medical technologies that enhance diagnostic precision and treatment outcomes. Key technologies include:

- South Asia's and India's first Naeotom Alpha Photon-Counting CT Scanner
- India's first All-in-One Bi-Plane Cath Lab<sup>49</sup>
- South Asia's first Genius AI 3D Mammography system
- India's first Ethos Linear Accelerator for adaptive radiotherapy
- India's first hospital with Exomind for Brain Wellness
- Western India's first ASTEC CCMCHRONOS Time-Lapse Incubator for AI-enabled embryo monitoring in IVF
- Mumbai's first SMILE Pro powered by Visumax 800, the world's fastest femtosecond laser

“The centre focuses on chronic disease management and advanced day-care therapies including chemotherapy, immunotherapy, dialysis, paediatric chemotherapy care, and specialised day-care services. <sup>51</sup>Jeevan also provides specialised care for chronic liver diseases through albumin infusion therapies, offers transfusion treatments for complex haematological conditions such as Sickle Cell Anaemia and Thalassemia Major, and includes sleep study diagnostics for the evaluation and management of sleep-related disorders. **Upcoming Services.** Further strengthening its clinical infrastructure, Reliance Foundation Hospital has introduced new dedicated ICU floors in March 2026 and a specialised bone marrow transplant unit. An advanced ambulatory care centre is also planned. These additions reinforce the hospital’s capability to

According to Reliance Foundation (2026) Access to quality and affordable healthcare is critical for improving overall health, identifying preventable diseases, and managing existing medical conditions. Through prompt, reliable and quality healthcare early diagnosis and intervention, can significantly improve treatment outcomes and save lives. <sup>52</sup>Reliance Foundation’s Health Outreach initiatives aim to achieve this by providing access to medical care, particularly for vulnerable communities which make a positive difference in the lives of millions. Through Mobile Medical Units (MMUs), Static Medical Units (SMUs), Community Health Centres (CHCs), and periodic health camps across states including Andhra Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Gujarat, Haryana, and Uttar Pradesh, the programme has facilitated over 8.1 million consultations, benefiting vulnerable patients. The Health Outreach programme is an

optimal, cost-effective, high-quality replicable working model to provide an all-encompassing preventive and primary healthcare care. It complements the available secondary and tertiary systems for low-resource clients (urban slum and chawl dwellers as well as the rural population) by providing free primary and preventive health care services at the doorstep of the needy. The programme has a pyramid design. At the base, a team of health workers and nurses provide preventive health screening in the community. A unique, community engagement initiative, designed based on community needs, it enables promotive and preventive health and disease detection, especially for Non-Communicable Diseases at people's homes. The door-to-door health service is followed by camps in the same communities- focusing on high risk individuals for diagnosis confirmation, education and treatment initiation; all this leads to minimal loss to follow-up and maximal coverage. **Medical Mobile Units.** The Medical Mobile Units, equipped with advanced technology, including cloud-based software for efficient patient management, bring essential healthcare services to the doorstep of beneficiaries, addressing their medical needs. These are equipped with all essential medicines and point-of-care devices for quality primary care services. Static Medical Units complement the MMUs, offering diagnostic and consultation services focusing on chronic conditions like hypertension and diabetes. Skilled doctors, nurses, and social workers play a crucial role in providing primary medical care to patients in need, with focused initiatives for vulnerable groups. These units have been vital in providing crucial healthcare support during the challenging times of the COVID-19 pandemic, especially in rural India. **Sir H.N. Reliance Health Outreach Programme - Delivering Free, Preventive and Curative Healthcare Since 2012.** Since its inception in 2012, the Sir H.N. Reliance Health Outreach Programme has been committed to extending high-quality, free healthcare services to underserved and vulnerable communities. Anchored in the philosophy of early detection, prevention, and continuity of care, the programme has evolved into a large-scale community health intervention addressing both immediate medical needs and long-term health outcomes<sup>53</sup> (Reliance Foundation, 2026, <https://www.reliancefoundation.org/what-we-do/health/health-outreach-initiatives>). **“Early Childhood Care & Education.** Advancing developmentally appropriate outcomes for children Early childhood care and education is key to a child’s development in the early years, as over 85% of a child’s cumulative brain development occurs prior to the age of six ([National Education Policy 2020](#)). Children learn best during their early years through exploration, curiosity, and imaginative play. <sup>58</sup>It is a world of wonder where they build connections,

Reliance Foundation recognises the transformative power of play-based learning during the foundational stage and has, since 2022, aimed to make developmentally rich play-based learning a widespread norm across India's early education system through the Early Childhood Care and Education programme. Reliance Foundation's Early Childhood Care and Education programme, in partnership with the Integrated Child Development Services (ICDS) scheme in Maharashtra and the Women Development and Child Welfare (WD&CW) Department in Telangana, is dedicated to strengthening early childhood education in India. By providing innovative models for capacity building, community engagement, and creating enabling environments at Anganwadis, the programme aims to lay a strong foundation for lifelong learning and development. **Creating conducive teaching-learning environment.** Reliance Foundation aims to create nurturing spaces that inspire curiosity, creativity, and holistic growth for young learners, fostering a brighter and exciting learning experience through a network of Anganwadi Learning Labs (AWLLs) and State ECCE Resource Labs (SERLs) in Maharashtra and Telangana. These nurturing environments also serve as demonstration, training, learning, and innovation spaces for Anganwadi staff. Reliance Foundation is investing in the redevelopment of AWLLs by upgrading key infrastructure, including enhanced kitchen and storage areas, access to purified drinking water, and dedicated outdoor play spaces. The redevelopment also introduces play equipment such as swings and slides, a nutrition garden, a range of educational toys, teaching-learning materials such as books, flashcards, and building blocks, as well as digital tools like a smart TV and laptop. In addition, child-friendly WASH facilities and age-appropriate furniture are being provided to create a safe, engaging, and developmentally supportive environment for children. The Anganwadis that are re-developed also incorporate Building as Learning Aid (BaLA) concepts in their design and murals inspired by local art forms, culture, and heritage. **Building strong foundation through capacity building.** <sup>59</sup>Capacity building is a key pillar of Reliance Foundation's ECCE programme, with focused training of Anganwadi staff playing a critical role in strengthening classroom practices and, in turn, improving child development and learning outcomes. Aligned

with the emphasis on play-based learning in NEP 2020, Reliance Foundation’s ECCE programme focuses on nurturing playful practitioners to create joyful and engaging classrooms. Its trainings are designed to be interactive and experiential, with a strong focus on language and cognitive development activities linked to foundational literacy and numeracy outcomes. Conducted within Anganwadi-Level Learning Labs (AWLLs), these trainings offer an ideal setting for Anganwadi staff to directly connect theory with practice, while ongoing onsite support from field teams helps reinforce learnings and strengthen the application of skills in real classroom contexts. **Parent and community engagement.** Parents, caregivers, and the community play a critical role in a child’s development, especially during the early years. Reliance Foundation’s ECCE programme recognises this by forming parent groups and providing them with guidance and support to engage children in meaningful activities at home, helping create a stimulating learning environment. Initiatives such as the celebration of ECCE Day, School Readiness Melas, and other ECCE-related events further strengthen ECCE awareness among stakeholders, enabling families to actively support their children’s learning and development at home”<sup>60</sup> (Reliance Foundation, 2026, <https://www.reliancefoundation.org/what-we-do/education/the-foundational-years-early-childhood-care-education>). According to Reliance Foundation (2026) **Foundational Literacy and Numeracy. Bridging the learning gap with Foundational Literacy and Numeracy.** Building on the Government of India’s NIPUN Bharat Mission to achieve universal Foundational Literacy and Numeracy (FLN) for children across India, LiftEd – a unique \$18mn outcomes-based initiative – has benefitted 4 million children in India across 15+ states. <sup>61</sup>As we mark four years of the NIPUN Bharat Mission, LiftEd is demonstrating how the private sector and civil society can come together through innovative financing structures to support and strengthen the government’s intent to universalise FLN by 2026-27. Reliance Foundation is a founding partner of LiftEd along with the Michael & Susan Dell Foundation, Bridges Outcomes Partnerships, the Maitri Trust, Atlassian, Standard Chartered Bank, and UBS Optimus Foundation. The British Asian Trust is the programme leader and Central Square Foundation and Dalberg Advisors are design and technical partners. LiftEd stands out for its innovative finance model and systemic impact. Using principles of outcomes-based financing, funding is tied to measurable results, ensuring

transparency, accountability, and efficiency. Instead of creating a parallel system, LiftEd strengthens the existing education ecosystem through three key interventions:

### **1. Development Impact Bond (DIB):**

Partners with state governments in five states (Himachal Pradesh, Haryana, Delhi NCR, Uttar Pradesh, and Bihar). Focuses on improving governance, transforming administrators into educators, and establishing effective classroom practices across public schools. Measures progress using children's learning assessments as defined by NIPUN Bharat alongside 'Systemic Shift Indicators' that track outcomes such as effective teacher mentorship and integration of FLN data within block review meetings. The education partners leading the implementation of the DIB are Kaivalya Education Foundation, Language and Learning Foundation, Peepul, and Pratham Education Foundation.

### **2. EdTech Accelerator:**

Develops high-quality, contextually relevant EdTech solutions to improve FLN for children from low-income families across 15+ states. Shapes the future of tech-based home learning for FLN by scaling effective EdTech solutions and generating deeper evidence on what works. Supports partners to solve specific anchor challenges to improve scale, engagement, and product contextualisation for low-income segments. The EdTech partners are Chimple, Ei Mindspark, Pratham Education Foundation, Rocket Learning, Sesame Workshop India, ThinkZone, and Top Parent.

### **3. District Innovation Challenge:**

A unique, state-level innovation challenge in partnership with a large state in east India to incentivise districts to improve FLN outcomes. LiftEd's innovative approach ensures it benefits millions of children over time by strengthening the education system itself. <sup>62</sup>For example, in the DIB's first year alone, the education partners have encouraged as many as 60% of government

meetings at the block level to regularly review FLN data and plans, translating these into concrete actions that improve FLN. Ultimately, LiftEd demonstrates the power of collaboration between civil society, government, and private sector (samaj-sarkar-bazar), unlocking the potential of young learners and reshaping India’s education landscape (Reliance Foundation, 2026, <https://www.reliancefoundation.org/what-we-do/education/foundational-literacy-and-numeracy>). With a **1:5 teacher–student ratio**, learners benefit from highly personalised attention and strong relationships that support both academic growth and wellbeing. Open, flexible, and thoughtfully designed learning spaces—indoors and outdoors—encourage inquiry, collaboration, reflection, and experiential learning beyond traditional classroom boundaries. 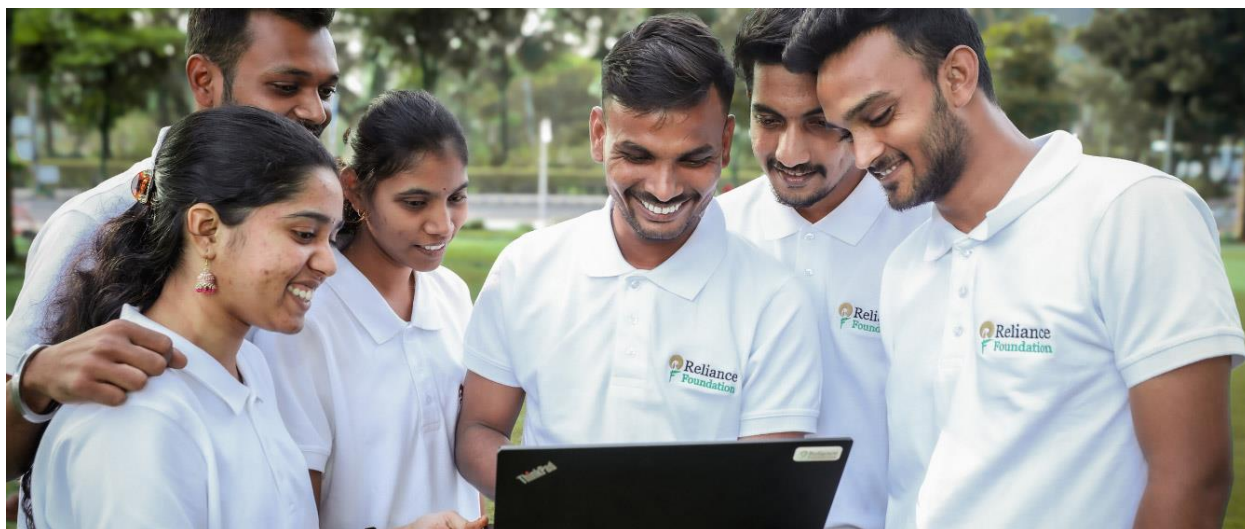

According to Reliance Foundation (2025) **A Community Leader Advancing Nature-Based Solutions**. Mrs Binapani Mangal, a grassroots volunteer from Akhuapada village in Nerada Gram Panchayat of Bhadrak district, has emerged as a committed changemaker through her active engagement with Reliance Foundation’s disaster risk reduction initiatives. Located close to the Baitarani River, her village is highly flood-prone and increasingly vulnerable to the impacts of climate change.<sup>83</sup> Seasonal flooding, river overflows and extreme weather events are recurring realities for the community. These challenges have strengthened Binapani’s resolve to work towards resilience and environmental protection. Over the past two years, she has played a pivotal role in advancing Nature-based Solutions in the district, particularly through palm conservation efforts. Reliance Foundation’s palm seed plantation drives aim to strengthen coastal and riverine resilience and contribute to lightning hazard risk reduction, in line with guidance from the Odisha State Disaster Management Authority (OSDMA). Binapani has been at the

Fuelling women’s entrepreneurial dreams.** In 2023, Reliance Foundation and Gates Foundation came together to empower one million women entrepreneurs in three states in India, by strengthening women collectives, testing and scaling innovations, and establishing replicable models of entrepreneurship with women-led enterprises.<sup>88</sup>The Swayamshree programme has achieved a milestone of reaching 10 lakh women across Madhya Pradesh, Gujarat, and Odisha to enhance their household incomes up to a minimum of Rs. 1 lakh per annum. The programme is working in close collaboration with each of the State Rural Livelihood Missions and is being implemented by on-ground NGO implementation partners. The programme, in collaboration with Reliance Foundation, the Gates Foundation and the State Rural Livelihood Missions of the three states, has empowered more than 3.25 lakh women towards becoming Lakhpati Didis. WomenLeaders India Fellowship: Cultivating change agents.** The WomenLeaders India Fellowship, powered by Reliance Foundation with technical inputs from Vital Voices, is a leadership development programme focused on advancing women’s leadership in India. <sup>89</sup>Launched in 2022, the fellowship has, to date, supported two cohorts, empowering a total of 100 women leaders from across the social sector. Across its first two rounds, the 10-month fellowship engaged 50 fellows per cohort working in areas including Rural Transformation, Education, Sports for Development, and Arts, Culture, and Heritage. This investment in women changemakers has translated into tangible leadership outcomes — 84% of fellows from Round 1 and 91% from Round 2 reported maintaining or significantly strengthening their confidence as women leaders, enabling them to lead with greater clarity and purpose within their organisations and communities (Reliance

At the heart of this vision is Vantara – a landmark wildlife rescue, conservation, and rehabilitation initiative in Jamnagar, Gujarat. One of the world’s largest such centres, it spans 3,500 acres and provides expert care to over 1.5 lakh animals across 2,000 species. With cutting-edge facilities, research, and veterinary excellence, Vantara redefines standards in wildlife care and conservation. **“I see God in animals and Vantara is my temple. It is born from a belief that every being, no matter how big or small, deserves dignity, care, freedom, and a chance to heal and live. At Vantara, we are not just saving animals; we are healing ecosystems, restoring balance, and redefining coexistence for our future generations.”- Shri Anant Mukesh Ambani, Founder, Vantara.** <sup>92</sup>Vantara is advancing animal care through AI and genomic research, decoding disease resistance patterns — including cancer resistance in elephants — and contributing to the UN’s 2030 Biodiversity Framework. It is also pioneering innovations such as robotic-assisted surgeries, teleconsultations, and species-specific ICU protocols. Beyond wildlife, Vantara supports environmental restoration and communities by planting 2.5 crore trees, cultivating medicinal herbs, and adopting renewable energy to reduce ecological impact. Alternative livelihood programmes help elephant owners and caregivers transition away from exploitative industries, while local veterinary capacity is strengthened through expert training and field camps. **Animal care in rural communities.** During disasters, support for domesticated animals becomes a priority, with veterinary treatment, feed aid, and advisories delivered to affected communities. Educational initiatives, such as student visits to veterinary hospitals and support to wildlife facilities, help raise awareness of conservation and biodiversity. According to Reliance Foundation (2025) **Chintu: The Little Otter Who Learned to Swim**. Chintu, an Asian small-clawed otter is one of the world’s smallest and most unique otter species. Native to freshwater wetlands, mangroves, and riverbanks across South and Southeast Asia, these otters are naturally agile swimmers and divers, spending much of their lives in and around

water.<sup>93</sup> But Chintu's early life was far from natural, living in captivity and raised in isolation, he was confined to a cramped enclosure with only a shallow water tray. He had never experienced flowing water, open space, or the instinctual joy of swimming behaviours essential not just for physical health, but for psychological well-being. Chintu's condition showed just how badly he had been affected by living in such an unnatural and uncaring environment. He wasn't just scared and withdrawn, he was also physically unwell. When he arrived at Vantara, he was not eating, the team examined him and found that he had serious dental problems. Two of his premolars were damaged, and he was struggling to eat and was in pain. But the most heartbreaking thing was his fear of water. Otters love water, it's where they play, explore, and feel most at home. But Chintu was terrified. He wouldn't even step into a shallow pool. It was clear that his time in captivity had taken away not only his freedom but his instincts from him. He didn't know how to be an otter anymore. The team at Vantara understood that water wasn't just part of his surroundings, it was part of who he was, helping him reconnect with it was the first step in helping him heal. Vantara's intervention focused on both Chintu's physical recovery and his emotional healing. After dental surgery and a soft fish diet to aid his recovery, the team turned to his psychological well-being. A temperature-controlled shallow pool was built to gently reintroduce him to water in a safe, controlled setting. Animal behaviour specialists designed an enrichment program that used visual cues and positive reinforcement to help him rebuild his confidence. Every small step a paw in the water, a curious glance, a hesitant splash was celebrated as a sign of progress. Through patient, consistent behavioural therapy, Chintu slowly began to reconnect with his natural instincts. He had once been afraid of water deep enough to swim in, but now he explored it with growing confidence and joy. Now from a fearful, hesitant little otter, he has blossomed into a confident swimmer who enjoys deep dives. These enclosures mimic the cool, flowing conditions of his wild habitat, with water carefully regulated for comfort, fun and health. Today, Chintu not only swims, he plays, explores, and glides through the water with ease, expressing the full range of natural otter behaviour's that were once unknown to him. There's something powerful about watching an otter slowly remember who

“**Mohini, the Loneliest Elephant, Rescued and Finds a New Family in Jamnagar.** For years, Mohini lived a life of isolation, far from her kind. Since she was a baby, she had never seen another elephant. Her world was a half-constructed shop in the heart of a bustling vegetable and fruit wholesale market in Jammu, surrounded by noise, people, and trucks. <sup>94</sup>The cramped space, with its low roof barely clearing her head and back, offered no shelter from the bitter cold during winter. Each day, she struggled to squeeze through the narrow doors, forced onto the hot, tarred

roads to beg for leftovers from households. Her unnatural life, walking on searing tar roads and eating leftover roti, rice, and sweets, took a toll on her body. Obese and showing early signs of arthritis and foot problems, Mohini's condition reflected years of neglect and a diet far from what nature intended for her. Thankfully, compassionate locals and an animal welfare organisation stepped in. They compiled and presented evidence of Mohini's abuse and illegal captivity to the relevant authorities. Their heartfelt plea was heard, and a plan was set in motion to provide Mohini with the life she truly deserved. In September 2023, Mohini's rescue began. Vantara was approached to offer her a new home. Under the careful supervision of Vantara's veterinarians, paravets, and experienced caretakers, she was transported to her new safe home in Jamnagar. The world changed for Mohini in an instant. At Vantara, she found companionship and joy with other rescued elephants, forming bonds that now feel like family. Her days now overflow with joy, leisurely strolls under the sun, splashing in big pools, playfully rolling in the soft sand and taking mud baths. At last, she is free to be herself, an elephant living her best life. ““**Volunteering.** Reliance Foundation believes in the power of collective action to drive meaningful social change. Guided by the We Care ethos, employees across the Reliance ecosystem contribute their time, skills and compassion to strengthen communities. From nurturing creativity in children to championing sustainability, volunteers continue to play a central role in shaping a more caring and inclusive society.<sup>98</sup>At the heart of this programme are *Volunteer Champions* — employees who take the lead in their neighbourhoods.
